Have you been forced to work without or with very low wage?

Do you offer sexual services without being able to choose your clients, or to keep your money? Are you afraid but you cannot leave?

Have you been forced to do things that you don't want to and you are afraid that the police may arrest you?

Has anyone offered you a job (in a farm, a factory, a house or sexual services etc.), which you accepted but now you are being forced to do a totally different job in very bad condition?

Have you been forced to do things that you don't want to, because a person has asked you to pay back some money?

It is not your fault:

The traffickers make their victims believe that they have agreed and that they are obliged to do what they tell them to.

You never agreed to your exploitation:

Somebody may try to exploit you, saying to you that you have no other choice but to work for them. You have the right to say "no". Even if you were forced to agree, this agreement is not valid. Very often the traffickers say that you have to work for them to pay back a large amount of money. You have no such obligation.

Your traffickers are not so powerful:

There are Services and Organisations that can protect you so that the traffickers will not be able to find you. If you decide to report them to the Police, there are provisions for your protection.



Human Trafficking is a serious crime. It means that a person exploits another person with the aim of making profit, by asking them to do things they don't want to, for example, to offer sexual services, to beg, to sell drugs, to steal or to work in very bad conditions.

If somebody forces you, threatens you or uses other ways to make you do any of the above, then you can ask for help and protection.

The law protects the victims of human trafficking:

Victims of human trafficking have rights and can be protected.

You will not be punished for illegal acts that you were forced to commit.

A professional can explain your rights, like safe shelter and legal support as well as the necessary procedures.
